The publication of two commemorative books, containing a compilation of talks given during the series of conferences "Darwin in the Balearic Islands" and papers and presentations given at the International Symposium on Islands and Evolution.



Charles Robert Darwin, born in Shrewsbury (England) on February 12th 1809, dedicated his entire life to science and strove to offer a rational and coherent interpretation of natural processes and the evolution of living beings. Influenced by his reading of Humboldt's travels and supported by J.S. Henslow, his professor at Cambridge, he began a voyage that would have a great impact on his own life and the rest of humanity's. He boarded the *Beagle*, which set sail on December 27th 1831 from Davenport to Patagonia, Tierra del Fuego, and some islands in the Pacific. His observations during this long journey, particularly on the Galapagos Islands, constituted the seeds that would lead to the publication in 1859 of his fundamental work "*On the Origin of Species by Means of Natural Selection, or the Preservation of Favoured Races in the Struggle for Life*", which sold out on the first day. In 1871 he published "*The Descent of Man and Selection in Relation to Sex*", in which he presented his arguments in favour of the notion that human beings appeared on this planet owing to similar processes as the rest of species. A year later, in 1872, his third great work, "*The Expression of the Emotions in Man*

and Animals", saw the light. It is an essential landmark in understanding that evolution affects not only physical but also behavioural traits, with the consequent implications for behavioural sciences. Charles Robert Darwin died on April 19th 1882 at his Down residence, and is buried in Westminster Abbey.

The year 2009 has internationally been declared “Darwin Year” in commemoration of the bicentennial of the birth of this distinguished scientist and the 150th anniversary of the publication of his seminal work on the origin of species.

The relevance of this anniversary, celebrated across the world, lies, on the one hand, in the direct repercussions of Darwinian and Neo-Darwinian theories on life sciences and, on the other hand, in the incorporation of multiple aspects of evolutionism into diverse fields of knowledge, such as the disciplines known as social sciences and humanities. The evolutionary ideas put forward by Darwin were integrated into numerous fields of knowledge, giving rise to new scientific and professional disciplines, reorienting the focus of others, facilitating the appearance of new explanatory models, and stimulating a disciplinary convergence in studies of the reality we inhabit. In addition, the social dissemination of evolutionary postulates, which have not always been correctly interpreted, caused an unprecedented impact on so-called “popular knowledge”, radically altering our conception

of the universe around us and deeply influencing the way we understand life.

Given all the above, with the participation of *Palma City Council* and other collaborating bodies and institutions, the *University of the Balearic Islands*, *Government of the Balearic Islands* and *Obra Social de “SA NOSTRA”* have been keen to join the numerous initiatives promoted by the international community. A programme of activities, with a clear multidisciplinary focus, has been organized that offers the citizens of the Balearics the opportunity to actively engage in Darwin’s legacy to humanity.

The *History of Health*, *History of Education*, and *Human Evolution and Cognition* research groups, together with the *Departments of Biology*, *Fundamental Biology*, and *Earth Sciences*, have put together a project that includes a series of activities to be conducted throughout the year. These activities are designed to involve different sectors of the islands’ population, with special attention to dissemination activities that have broad social coverage and those involving the participation of different educational strata, levels, and bodies.

A series of conferences and round tables entitled “*Darwin at the UIB*” of a multidisciplinary nature, aimed at students from the *University of the Balearic Islands*. Students attending will be awarded free-choice credits.

A series of specialist conferences entitled “*Darwin in the Balearic Islands I*”, given by prestigious scientists at the *University of the Balearic Islands* and “SA NOSTRA” Cultural Centre (No. 12 Carrer de la Concepció).

A series of film forums on Darwin and evolutionism to be held at *Municipal Theatre* (Passeig Mallorca, 9), offered by *Palma City Council* (march-april) and at “SA NOSTRA” Cultural Centre (No. 12 Carrer de la Concepció) (october).

A series of conferences entitled “*Darwin in the Balearic Islands II*”, given by internationally renowned scientists, in collaboration with the *Institut d’Estudis Catalans*.

The *International Symposium on Islands and Evolution*, held at the *Museu de Menorca*, Maó (Minorca), between September 14th and 17th 2009.
